

Burton Couple Joint Services To Be Tomorrow

Joint funeral services will be conducted from Laurel Grove Baptist Church tomorrow at 2 p. m. for Mr. and Mrs. J. Fred Burton, who died within two hours' time yesterday in a hospital at Charlotte, N. C.

The bodies are at Townes Funeral Home and burial will be in the Kerns Memorial Church cemetery at Sutherland.

Mrs. Burton was taken to the hospital Saturday with pneumonia and Mr. Burton suffered a stroke the same day. Mrs. Burton died at 7:18 a. m. and Mr. Burton died at 8:50 a. m. Sunday.

Mr. Burton was born in Pittsylvania County, July 8, 1870, being a son of the late James M. Burton and Emma Clark Burton. He was a prominent and well known farmer of Sutherland and was a member of Laurel Grove Baptist Church, and Kent Lodge of Masons. He and Mrs. Burton moved to Charlotte, N. C., November 1954 to live with their son.

Eliza Daniel Burton was born in Pittsylvania County, August 18, 1871, being a daughter of the late George Daniel and Ann Haymes Daniel. She was also a member of Laurel Grove Baptist Church.

They are survived by one son, James Trevilian Burton of Charlotte, N. C. Mr. Burton leaves one brother, J. E. (Nick) Burton of Sutherland.

Funeral services were conducted from the Port Republic Methodist Church. Her pastor, the Rev. L. D. Stables, assisted by the Rev. H. B. Alexander had charge of the services, with burial in the family lot of the Port Republic Cemetery.

WINS TITLE

FALUN, Sweden (AP)—Russia's stranglehold on the European speed skating championships was broken yesterday by tall Sigge Ericsson, who gave Sweden its first title in eight years.

In the two-day competition, Ericsson won the five and ten thousand meter events, was third in the 1,500 and 19th in the 500. He wound up with 205,960 points compared to 207,053 for Russia's Oleg Goncharenko in second place.

Russia's Boris Shilkov, current world champion, wasn't among the first 10.
